Echoes of Loss: Voices of Change Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Event

Thanks to our partnership with the Village of Wellington, we were able to host this important event on August 21 at 6:00 PM at the Wellington Community Center. We displayed our tribute to the Faces of Fentanyl memorial—created by the Drug Enforcement Administration—honoring the lives tragically lost to fentanyl poisonings and overdoses. This moving exhibit put faces to the statistics, offering a powerful reminder of the human toll behind the crisis.

The evening featured speakers Julie Camacho, Legislative Aid Reid Ragsdale, and Deputy Sheriff Bradley Shouse, and Dr. Steven Keehn, Chief of Emergency Medicine at HCA Florida JFK North Hospital, who provided valuable insights into the impact of fentanyl in our communities and strategies for prevention.

This gathering served as an opportunity for remembrance, reflection, and action—uniting the community in hope and healing while amplifying education and awareness.

Florida Bans Potent Kratom Compound, Calling It as Addictive as Opioids

According to CBSNews.com, Florida Attorney General James Uthmeier issued an emergency rule on Wednesday, August 13, 2025, to ban the potent kratom compound known as 7-OH, or 7-hydroxymitragynine. This action was taken in response to rising addiction concerns and an increase in emergency room visits linked to the substance.

The ban occurred amid pressure from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to address the dangers of 7-OH, which some officials have



U.S. Drinking Rate at New Low as Alcohol Concerns Surge

According to Gallup's latest Consumption Habits survey (July 7–21), only 54% of U.S. adults report drinking alcohol—the lowest figure in nearly 90 years of tracking. This decline parallels a shift in attitudes, with most Americans now viewing moderate drinking as harmful to health. Together, these findings point to a constructive shift in awareness and behavior.
